### Graduate Student Research

Our graduate students are heavily involved in research activities as evidenced by their participation at academic conferences. Over the past five years (2018-2023), our graduate students have authored or co-authored 58 papers presented at national or regional academic conferences. In some cases this represents work done exclusively by the student, in others it involves collaborative work with a professor. Students are also getting their own work published. Over the last five years, students have published approximately 25-30 articles or chapters (exclusive from publications co-authored with faculty). These have appeared in a variety of publications such as *Children*, *Early Modern Digital Review*, *History of Political Thought*, *Journal of Autoethnography*, *Journal of Peacebuilding & Development*, *Social Science Quarterly*, *Studies in Urban Humanities*, and *Theoria: A Journal of Social and Political Theory*.
